Clophill through the years

The early years of education in Clophill

Early Schooling

Towns, like Bedford with its Harpur Trust, have been well provided with schools but poor rural villages like Clophill struggled to finance schools. It was mainly through local voluntary effort, led by clergymen, that early education developed in the village.

Clophill was an agricultural community where the men worked mostly in the fields as agricultural labourers and their wives and children worked at straw plaiting, a common cottage industry. There

were straw plait schools for the young children where, as well as learning to plait straw, they may have received some basic education such as learning to read. Older boys would be sent to join their fathers working on farms to supplement the family income.

For those who could afford it, there were what was known as 'Dame Schools' run by women in their own home. Children were given a basic education starting with reading and writing.

Initially the clergy set up Sunday Schools. These were schools that took place on Sundays as the children were either at straw plait school or working in the fields for the rest of the week. Here they were taught to read the bible and instructed in the Liturgy and Catechism.

Central Government

In 1807 Samuel Whitbread (of Southhill Park) introduced a bill in parliament to give each child two years of education but the government didn't see the benefit of educating the rural poor. It was considered too expensive to implement and it was also thought that the introduction of such a scheme would take the people away from manual work and make them dissatisfied with their social situation.

In 1818 the government started to see the benefit of the education of rural children and carried out a review asking four questions. The response for Clophill was:

- 1. Clophill population 721
- 2. A Sunday school for 60 boys, the funds of which are £6 per annum
- 3. Two Sunday schools for 80 girls, 30 of whom are clothed
- 4. The poor are desirous of education.

The Elementary Education Act of 1870 was the very first piece of legislation to deal specifically with the provision of education in Britain. The Act made provision for the elementary education of all children aged 5-13 and established school boards to oversee and complete the network of schools and to bring them all under some form of supervision. The Elementary Education Act of 1880 finally made school attendance compulsory between the ages of five and ten; in 1893 Legislation extended the age of compulsory attendance to 11, and in 1899 to 12.

Churches

Despite the government view, there were many people who wanted to provide education for children. In 1811, the National Society for Promoting the Education of the Poor in the Principles of the Established Church in England and Wales was founded. Known as the National Society, it started to make grants towards setting up schools. The society believed that the National Religion should be made the foundation of National Education.

Schools in Clophill

The first mention of formal education in the village is in a deed of Mr Richard Read dated 1630 which concerns the gift of a plot of land to build a school, but there's no evidence that it was built.

In 1799 the Rev. Nethersole, the rector of Clophill, started a school for 30 girls at what is now Taylor's Cottage in the High Street near the Old Rectory. Above where the doorway used to be is a stone lintel with the Latin inscription 'JANUA VITAE VERBUM DOMINI' which can be translated as 'the gateway to life (is) the word of the Lord'.

In 1835 the National Society made a grant towards building a school for 110 boys. This was the building later known as the Reading Room that was to the east of the church in the High Street. It was demolished to make way for a detached house.

In 1871 the National Society made a grant of £100

in aid of building schools and a teacher's residence. This school (shown opposite) stood on the land in front of the present St Mary's School and was officially opened in 1872.

The curriculum as stated in the Log Book was arithmetic, reading, writing, dictation, scripture (often taken by the Rector) and sewing for the girls. About 50 of the older pupils were 'part-timers' due to the plait, horticultural and agricultural work, and many pupils went missing during the summer terms because they were working on the harvest. Here are some examples from the school log book:-

- 23 June 1893 Some children have been irregular [this week] owing to their mothers going out and gathering peas or fruit and the children kept at home to mind the house and baby.
- **15 March 1822** 16 boys left school for a few weeks to go stone-picking. 5 went to Countess Cowper's to work.
- **6 October 1829** Owing to the harvest being so backward this year another week's holiday was given to enable the children to go gleaming.
- In 1973 St Mary's School was built and the Old National School was subsequently demolished.

News on Clophill's grit bins

Central Bedfordshire's Highways department is responsible for gritting the major roads in our area during the winter months. It grits approximately half of the road network in Central Bedfordshire when road temperatures are predicted to drop below zero, focusing on roads carrying the most traffic and where there's the highest risk of accidents. In the case of Clophill, the High Street is the main priority.

In addition, Central Bedfordshire provides grit bins for public use on roads and pavements only. These bins are generally sited at bends or hills where the risk of slipping on ice is greatest. In Clophill, there's a salt bin at the junction of Mill Lane and Kiln Lane.

The Parish Council receives frequent requests for gritting on minor roads in the village. We've spoken to Central Beds Council but they don't have the resources to grit minor roads. However, they've provided one ton of salt for the Parish to spread at key locations.

We've purchased two new grit bins which are now sited at the junction of Back Street and Readshill and Kiln Lane, opposite the Village Hall. We're extremely grateful to Mr Richard Parrish of Kiln Farm who supplied his tractor, and, together with volunteers from the village, transported the salt from the Pound to the new bins. We're aware of other areas in the village that would benefit from a salt bin near Jacques Lane and Castle Hill Court. The Council hopes to be able satisfy this need in time for the 2014/15 winter.



We hope this initiative by the Parish Council will be beneficial to residents who live on our minor roads. We must point out, however, that the salt is for spreading on icy roads and pavements and is NOT for use on private drives.

This month, editor Helen Gent talks to wannabe baking star Lorna McLellan



Earlier this year, ex-Clophill resident Lorna McLellan applied for The Great British Bake Off – a televised baking competition where amateur bakers battle it out to be crowned the UK's Best Amateur Baker – and she's now through to the London audition for the show.

G I'm really excited,' says Lorna. 'Last year, 17,000 people applied so even if I don't get picked for the show, making it this far makes me really proud. I filled out an online

application form in January, but didn't think I'd hear anything back. Then I was at work one day and I got a call saying my application had been successful. I remember I was in the middle of a training session and I said, 'Sorry, I've got to go – it's the BBC on the phone'. I talked to a researcher for about an hour, then a week later I got another call to say I was through to the London audition. I was ecstatic.

I was taught to bake when I was about five by my Scottish mum and nanna. I used to help them in the kitchen making things like shortbread and fairy cakes, then I progressed to baking bread. My parents were real foodies and I was always watching food programmes on TV. I find cooking very relaxing. And part of the joy is getting compliments from people saying how much they like what I've made. I'm always making birthday cakes for colleagues at work. I used to take a cake in as a surprise, but now they come to me and ask if I'll do them one!

Since my niece, Niahm, was born three years ago I've been making her birthday cakes, too. This year I did a 'Hello Kitty' one and her face was a picture when she saw it. She loved telling everyone that her auntie had made it. I spent ages practising fashioning the characters out of sugar paste before I made

the final cake. Now Niamh is getting a bit older she likes to bake with me when I go to see her. We'll do things like pizza dough, scones and Hallowe'en cakes.

I'm often inspired by other people. Vaughan Wilton is someone I've always looked to for advice, as he makes all the cakes for their annual summer party. This year I was so excited when he asked me if I'd make some cakes for their black-themed party – I did Black Forest gateau cupcakes, which seemed to go down very well.



I'm now waiting to hear what date I have to go into London for my audition. I know I'll have to take in two things – one savoury, one sweet – to be sampled but I've no idea if I'll meet the judges Mary Berry and Paul Hollywood. I think I'll be really nervous, especially if I've got a TV camera filming my every move. Right now, though, it all just seems a bit surreal. It's great to have all my family, friends and work colleagues behind me, though. I think they're all hoping I get through so they can be my guinea pigs – I'll certainly need to do lots of baking!

Clophill & District Flower Club

On Thursday 6th February members and visitors to the club were entertained by one of the club's favourite demonstrators, Doug Howard. His theme for the evening was



'As Winter Fades' – whisking us through the seasons and taking us from fading Winter through to exotic holiday places, retirement, Easter and Spring in all its glory.

Doug's first arrangement was two symmetrical triangles in silver vases. He included lots of beautiful greenery, Italian buck thorn, pyracantha, begonia leaves, blue sea holly, white skimma, variegated holly and silvered leatherleaf fern, to which he added white roses and lilies.

The 'Retirement' arrangement was **bright** red gerbera and aspidistra leaves.

Some leaves were wired together to add height and to follow the style of the wrought-iron stand. Other leaves curved and twisted into different shapes, enhancing the bright red gerbera. Lime green sisal was added to lighten the rich colours.

Easter's arrangement was a willow weave cradle-shaped basket with tall pussy willow, green marble arum lily leaves, begonia leaves, variegated ivy and leatherleaf fern. **Purple Dutch irises** and red tulips tipped with yellow were included, and added to this were rings of pussy willow for interest and two floppy bunnies.





For Doug's **'Summer Holiday'** we were transported to a hot tropical jungle with two beautiful pink orchid arrangements. These were arranged on a piece of bleached driftwood. Trailing foxtail

fern blended with purple mahonia leaves, leucadendron, yellow fatsia leaves and leatherleaf fern completed the picture.

Lastly, **'Spring'** was a wonderful array of golden daffodils, cream tulips, pale green carnations, roses (Cuba gold) and tall orinithogalums with variegated trailing ivy, ruby begonia leaves, leatherleaf fern,

yellow spot laurel and evergreen garrya-elliptica – all staged on a high black squared frame.

CARL'S FESTIVE CHEER FOR A LOCAL CHARITY

In the November 2013 issue of Spotlight we reported that Clophill resident Carl Colyer was switching on the Christmas tree lights outside his house to raise money for the **East Anglian Air Ambulance** – something he has been doing for the past four years. Well we can now tell you that **Carl raised an excellent £203 for the charity**. So a huge thank you to Carl and everyone who donated to this worthy cause.

Let's talk about tax

with Sally Cobban





Well as we fast approach the end of another tax year – 5th April 2014 – there are a couple of things to consider for the self-employed or for limited companies with a March year end. **Now is a good time to buy capital equipment** – ie, that new van/laptop/ machine that you've been considering.

This is because if you purchase the item towards the end of the tax year you get the tax relief sooner. Basically it means that the transaction falls into the end of this year, so you get the full capital allowances in the tax year, as opposed to buying a capital item at the start of the tax year – in which case you'll have to wait until after 5th April 2015 to claim your capital allowances. **Capital items can't be expensed** (offset against profit) in your accounts, so capital allowances need to be claimed instead.

There's an allowance called the **Annual Investment Allowance** which is currently £250,000 (this was increased from £25,000 for 2 years from 1st Jan 2013 so it won't stay this high for long). This allowance means that businesses can claim 100% of the cost of capital plant and machinery (NOT cars!) against its profits. So buying that piece of capital equipment in March will lead to a good tax saving (it becomes the same effect as if you did expense all of it). *Here's an example I made earlier...*

- Self-employed trader who turns over £40,000 and makes a taxable profit of £20,000 in the tax year to 5th April 2014. The tax due on that, payable in Jan 2015, will be £3,228 (inc Class 4 NI).
- If the trader had bought a new van and a machine, which cost a total of £9,500, in March then still making £20,000 of profit, his tax payable in Jan 2015 would be £473 (Inc class 4 NI).
- So buying this capital equipment leads to a tax saving of £2,755.

You can claim capital allowances on plant and machinery that you own – not leased or hired – even if you're buying them over a hire purchase deal. HMRC don't care about how you finance capital items but you do have to be the owner of them. If you do HP a new van then you can also claim the HP interest as a tax deductible expense through your accounts.

Personal allowances and tax rate bands for the 2014-2015 tax year

Personal allowance (ie, the amount you can earn before paying tax): £10,000 **Personal allowance** > 65yrs: £10,500

20% Basic rate band on income: f0-f31,865

40% Higher rate band on income: £31,866-£150,000

45% Additional rate band on income over £150,000: You start to lose your personal allowance on income over £100k - £1 of personal allowance for every £2 of income over £100k - so by £120k it's gone!

Hello everyone. Wow, what a wet and windy time we've been having and the children have been enjoying some fantastic activities out in this weather. We've been out every session to explore and run and play and jump and laugh and pretty much get wet!

We made **streamers to hold up to the sky** to see which direction the wind was blowing. We listened to the noises the wind made as it blew from whistling to howling to rumbling, and we moved our bodies copying the sway of the trees. One of our children told us the story of the giant who was walking outside and it was his big footsteps that made the sound of the wind.

One of our most exciting investigation days was developed from listening to children's interests and responding to the weather – when it's very wet and windy it can be difficult to get lots of activities out so we make sure we go outside and explore the wider area. Our children **all love to dig up the molehills** so we often take buckets and spades and collect mud for the mud kitchen. On one occasion we examined a dead mole noticing that he didn't have visible eyes and we pondered

Fast food – the healthy way

This year I'm going to focus on **quick**, **easy and healthy recipes** that can be rustled up in no time at all.

Saltimbocca alla Romana (*Chicken Scaloppini with Parma Ham and Sage*) The name saltimbocca means 'jump into the mouth' – the idea being that it's so wonderfully delicious you can't help popping a piece into your mouth straightaway. There are many variations on saltimbocca – for example you can add cheese or Marsala wine – but I've opted for the simplest recipe, just like it's cooked in Roman kitchens.

INGREDIENTS Serves 4 people

- 4 skinless chicken breasts
 4 slices Parma ham
- Extra virgin olive oil
- 40g butter
- 12 fresh sage leaves
- plain flour for dusting
- 120cl dry white wine
- salt & freshly ground black pepper

- **1.** Slice the chicken breasts lengthwise into 3 slices.
- 2. Cover the slices with plastic film and flatten using a meat pounder or rolling pin.
- 3. Dust the chicken slices in the seasoned flour, shaking away any excess.
- 4. Cut each slice of Parma ham into 3 pieces and remove the stalks from the sage leaves.
- **5.** Place a piece of Parma ham on each slice of chicken then top with one sage leaf. Hold everything in place with a wooden toothpick.
- **6.** Put the oil and the butter in a large frying pan and turn the heat to medium. When the butter begins foaming, place the chicken in the pan and sauté gently on both sides until light brown.
- 7. Add the wine, turn the heat to medium high, and let the wine evaporate.
- **8.** Remove the chicken and place on individual plates. Cover the slices with the sauce and serve warm.

News from Clophill Heritage Trust



Our official launch for both the Eco Lodges and St Mary's Church will be spring 2014, but we endeavour to have some of the lodges ready earlier, allowing us to introduce a light footfall into the accommodation and facilities so that we can monitor and test all amenities.

The lodges are set in an attractive little wood and will provide **overnight**

accommodation for walkers, residential courses and general visitors to the area as well as being a group space for heritage, eco and craft educational activities.

There are four lodges – each one has two rentable individual rooms with a Jack-and-Jill shower room and a private balcony with stunning views. We have four double rooms and four twin rooms, and a temporary fold-up bed can be added if there's a young child or a party of three staying. One of the lodges has full disabled access and facilities.

The communal area has **a kitchen area for self-catering** or there's the option of home-cooked meals from the warden. With its large windows looking out onto the view, the communal area will provide a peaceful relaxation area, and here you will find useful information and be able to socialise with other visitors. The communal area will also be used for meetings, private hire and educational purposes when not occupied. Many activities are already in place for 2014.

Clophill Heritage Trust consists of eight volunteers and is supported by over 100 volunteers across the area. The eco and heritage projects are totally grant-funded and the Trust will need all the revenue from the Eco Lodges to maintain the scheduled ancient monument, pay for the warden and to run all the educational activities. We're therefore **always looking for volunteers and funders** to come and help with the project.

Currently **we need an additional £90,000** to complete the eco installation, disabled access and offerings and the community room fit-out.

Phase 1: the consolidation of the ancient monument, costing £550,000, is fully funded.



Work is currently going on to restore and repair the ruin. This phase has been funded by English Heritage, WREN, Wixamtree Trust, Architectural Heritage Fund, Village SOS and the Aurelius Charitable Trust. Phase 1 also included the construction of the shells of the Eco Lodges with funding from the Rural Development Programme for Eastern England and Central Bedfordshire Council.

Phase 2: the completion of the Eco Lodges

To fit out the community and educational area and accommodation eco lodges (including disabled access), installation of green technology (geothermal heat pump, borehole water processing and off-grid electricity) and landscaping. This final phase will cost £90,000.

Neighbourhood Watch

A Neighbourhood Watch scheme (or Homewatch as it was previously known) has been operating in Clophill for several years. A number of residents have kindly volunteered to act as street co-ordinators during this time, but coverage in the village is very sparse. We'd therefore welcome more residents who'd be interested in joining the scheme, either to cover a part of a street, or just a few houses in their locality

Briefly, the main role of a street co-ordinator is to:-

- Maintain contact with residents to exchange information.
- Inform residents about local crime.
- Encourage the reporting of any suspicious incidents.
- Liaise with the Area Co-ordinator.

Ringmaster

Ringmaster is a computerised crime messaging system run by Bedfordshire Police. It offers local residents, Neighbourhood Watch members, businesses, farms, and Bedfordshire Police partners, throughout Bedfordshire, details about crime and events in their local area.

- You don't need to be involved in Neighbourhood Watch to join Ringmaster.
- You can receive information via email, review your messages online or receive messages via phone at a time to suit you.

Notes from the Parish Council Meeting held on 25th February 2014

(Readers are reminded that these notes are a resume only, official minutes are available both on the internet and notice boards. All official correspondence should be sent to the parish clerk and not individual councillors.)

Public Question Time

There were no questions from the public.

Council Appointments

Mr Paul Downing was welcomed as our new Councillor to his first meeting. Additionally, Mr Peter Liddle, who the Council co-opted to the Planning Committee, was welcomed to his first meeting. The Parish Council is now at full strength.

Boxing Club

The Council was pleased to see the Boxing Club held its first meeting on 25th February and is planning to meet two nights a week. We wish it every success.

Police Report

In the month 28th January to 24 February 2014 there was only one recorded incident of burglary and one report of antisocial behaviour. This was 50% lower than the same period last year.

The Land Committees

Talks are ongoing with Central Bedfordshire Council, Amey and UK Power Networks regarding the removal of the old bridge at the Post Office. It's hoped to get a resolution to the costs involved in the next few weeks, and then we'll be able to determine when work can commence.

The Council have agreed to a new lease for the Archery Club to run for 14 years to commence from the expiry of the present agreement.

Following a meeting with Highways all the pot holes and places where the road is breaking up have been recorded with CBC – however, the majority aren't considered severe enough to warrant repair at this time. For information, how bad the pot hole has to be for it to be repaired can be seen on the notice boards where leaflets are displayed with full details.

Central Beds Councillors

The Councillors reported that Central Beds Council has agreed that the new leisure centre at Flitwick can now proceed. They also advised that shortly there will commence a new consultation regarding the future of Bedford Hospital and how it might relate to Milton Keynes. We all need to read this and respond with our views as it could contain some contentious proposals.

It was also stated that BT will be extending fibre optic cable to the Silsoe exchange this year, the arrival of which should increase broadband speeds up to 20mbs, depending on how far you are from the exchange.

Neighbourhood Plans

A progress report was given to the Council which, at this stage, involves determining all the stakeholders that we need to involve in the future discussions. The next stage will be to determine the most appropriate methods of engaging with these agreed stakeholders. The stakeholders will include, among others, all residents of Clophill plus businesses, land owners, clubs and other organisations in the village.

Planning – February 2014

Consultation Response

The PC has responded to CBC's consultation into its 'Allocations Scheme Proposals'. CBC is required to consult over its proposals to update its Allocations Rules for council/ association housing following changes to housing law in the Localism Act and has consulted on its proposed re-write (advised in December Spotlight). The PC considers that CBC's proposals are well made and are supportive of them. The PC response expresses two concerns – the needs to encourage more such affordable housing, and easing 'trading-down' to smaller dwellings where this is appropriate for the occupant – and one suggestion requiring CBC to insist on developers providing at least the legally required number of affordable houses (presently, developers are able to buy-off this requirement with a payment to CBC which doesn't necessarily benefit Clophill – and hasn't in the past).

New CBC Consultation: Gypsy/Traveller Sites

CBC has launched a new consultation on the Gypsy and Traveller Local Plan 2014 and residents are invited to respond. This amended Plan takes account of responses to the 2013 original draft. CBC has a legal duty to consider the accommodation needs of gypsies and travellers up to 2031 and the document proposes sites to meet the task. No new sites are proposed for Clophill. However, in view of what has already happened in Clophill and what might develop in the future, the opportunism of 'windfall' sites might arise. It's important that residents' views are expressed to CBC – **the deadline for responses is 31 March**.
