#### Come into the Garden

#### With Kate Gardner

There's lots going on in June this year both locally and in the wider community. The Queens Platinum jubilee celebrations kick start the month and then we have the Clophill Open gardens over the weekend of  $25^{\text{th}}$  &  $26^{\text{th}}$ .



As I'm writing this, I've just finished watching the opening day of the RHS Chelsea flower show and this year there are lots of gardens which focus on the benefits of being outside and encouraging wildlife and wildflowers into our gardens. Mental health and the value of outside space was thrown into the spotlight during the pandemic and for many people this was the first time that they had the time to have a go at gardening. So for the next couple of editions I'm going to show how you can create an edible garden that contains flowers, herbs, seeds, berries and plants that you can eat.

When planning what to plant in your edible garden, things to think about including your favourite fruits, vegetables, herbs and other edible plants. Grow plants you like to see, smell or touch and include plants that you need a small amount of but often, such as herbs.

Examples of flowers, herbs and plants that are suitable for an edible garden include:

- Flowers borage, chamomile, chrysanthemum, fuchsia, hollyhock, honeysuckle, impatiens, lavender, lilac, marigold, nasturtium, pansy, rose, salvia, sunflowers and violet
- herbs rosemary, basil, chives, sage, mint, oregano, parsley and thyme
- · vegetables lettuce, tomatoes, beetroot, courgettes, french beans, peas, leeks
- fruits rhubarb, blueberries, strawberries, raspberries.

Its not too late to start plants from seed, but remember that you don't want to sow everything in one go; otherwise all the plants will be ready at the same time. Take lettuce for example. A packet will keep the village in salad for weeks so just sow a small pinch of seeds every couple of weeks. Prick out the seedlings when they get their first couple of true leaves, grow on in pots for a couple of weeks and then plant your lettuce out in garden in a shady spot.

You can create a wigwam of poles and sow climbing French beans into quite a small space. 2 bean seeds planted at the base of each pole will give you plenty of juicy sweet beans to pick. If you don't fancy growing from seed then pick out some small climbing bean plants from the garden centre. Mulch the soil once they are established to reduce evaporation from around the roots.

Plant a single courgette and pick the fruits when they are young. The amazing yellow male flowers (on a long stem, rather than on a developing baby courgette), can be stuffed or dipped in batter and fried to make an amazing snack. If you plant into the ground make sure you add plenty of good compost or well-rotted horse manure as they are hungry plants.

Autumn fruiting raspberries make a great addition along a fence. They fruit on this years stems anytime from July to the first frosts, they don't need tying in and you cut them back down hard to the ground in the winter. Fresh picked raspberries don't last long in our house!

If you fancy fresh cucumbers then go for an outdoor variety such as Marketmore and let the plants clamber up an established tree or along a fence, Cherry tomatoes can be grown outdoors in pots or growbags and how about growing leeks in an old pair of wellies. How about sunflowers, the national flower of Ukraine, now is the perfect time to sow seeds and they also make amazing cut flowers.

We've been looking at various types of animals, from those under the sea to ones we can find outside under logs. Continuing with the children's interests in Sea creatures, we made a giant jellyfish complete with tentacles which is now the doorway to our playhouse and, as usual, we had lots of topic related activities available daily - from practicing our cutting skills making fish collages to threading pasta onto pipe cleaners to create our own octopus tentacles!

For hedgehog appreciation week, we learnt some fun facts about them in our Early Years Jack in the Box as well as how to help them. We looked at the hedgehog house outside Acorn Nursery and read the book 'The Hedgehogs full moon party'. Throughout our

Amazing Animals topic, we are learning about David Attenborough and his life's work - the children have been interested in learning about his life and the incredible work he has done in the natural world. Some of our children were particularly interested in some of the amazing birds he discovered and this led to lots of bird related investigation - looking for birds, discussing different types, looking at their life cycle and even their anatomy!

We have spaces available in our superb Nursery for September 2022, if you (or





#### Clophill's Serving Survivors of WW1

Continuing our series in celebration of Clophill's brave men who fought in and survived the first world war...

Cecil Sharman was born in Clophill in 1897, son of William and Emily. In 1911 he worked as a Farm Labourer and lived at Beadlow. Cecil was an Ordinary Seaman, starting his naval service in 1916. He was based on HMS Pembroke, which



were shore barracks at Chatham. He served on H.M.S. Titania a submarine depot ship, H.M.S. Dido and H.M.S. Hecla which were both depot ships. The family had lived in Back Street in previous years. He was a fireman and described as 'of good character'. He was 5' 6" tall and served until 1919. He married Elizabeth (possibly Odell in 1916). By 1939 they were living in Wolverton and Cecil was an Electrical Store Keeper and is believed to be brother of James below.

**James Sharman** was born in Clophill in 1879 and was probably brother of Cecil above. He had served in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Bedfordshire Regiment from 1911. He signed up for 4 years, describing himself as married, aged 31, and working for Lord Lucas as a labourer woodman. Lord Lucas of Wrest Park also owned a number of Market Gardens in Clophill.

James was a Corporal during this first period of service but at his own request reverted to the rank of Private in April 1915. He re-enlisted in August 1916 as a member of the 5<sup>th</sup> Bedfordshire Regiment. He also served in the Dorsetshire Regiment. He gave his address as High Street, Clophill. He served in England until the beginning of 1917 and arrived in France in February 1917, where he fought in many battles including those at Arras, Cambrai and the Somme. He arrived back in England in July 1917 having received "a severe Gun Shot Wound" to the thigh and was invalided out and discharged from the services in November of that year, but spent many months in hospital.

James had married Mary Jane King in Haynes in November 1900 and according to his War Record had 6 children up to the time of his discharge. The family lived at 24 Jacques Lane until his death in 1943.

**Walter Sharman** was born in Clophill in 1888. He was a Horseman in 1911 and his parents were William & Mary Ann. The family lived in Jacques Lane. He married Mary Webb (sister to Augustus & Herbert Charles on our memorial) in 1912. Later his occupation was described as "in the employ of the County Surveyor." He was a Private in the Royal Army Medical Corps. He enlisted in October 1915 and was in France in 1916. He was severely wounded at Thiepval in September 1916 and invalided home for hospital treatment.

Walter was demobilised in March 1919. He returned to live in Jacques Lane with his wife until 1927 when they moved to 119 High Street. His occupation in 1939 was County Council Labourer. Walter died in 1965.

**William Samuel Sharman (or King)** –was born in 1898 in Haynes, son of James and Mary Jane (née King). The family had moved to the High Street Clophill by 1911.

He was a Private in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Bedfordshire Regiment. He volunteered as a 15yr old in August 1914 and served with his Battalion in the UK until drafted to Egypt in March 1917. He took part in fighting at Gaza during the British Advance through Palestine. After the Armistice he proceeded to India and in 1920 he was still serving, having volunteered to serve another 4 years in 1919. In that same year Ampthill News reported "Pte. W. Sharman, 2nd Batt. Beds Regiment, stationed at Colchester visited Clacton Sept. 21st, 1919 and whilst walking on the pier heard a cry for help. Looking over into the sea he saw a boy in difficulties. Having divested himself of his cap, belt and tunic, he dived into the water and brought the boy safely to shore. A collection was made, and Sharman was the recipient of £4 10s. He was formerly a member of the Clophill Troop of Boy Scouts." His home address later was Jacques Lane, Clophill. Nothing further is certain about this man.

## Reflections – Clophill in April 1977 - Voices from the past

Continuing our series looking back at previous issues of Spotlight and Clophill Village life... By Julie Benson

Firstly, I have to say a big 'Sorry' to Nicky James, who was on the end of the bottom row of brownies in the photo of last month – and who I 'cropped off '. Didn't mean to do that. Also, I understand that it was Mrs Brownley, the Guider with Sally Myers, not Diane Hughes. My sincerest apologies go to both ladies.

Now, way back, as in forty-five years ago, we had our very own local pop group – 'Home Brew' – and it played regularly at the village hall and surrounding villages by the sounds of it. None so recent as 13<sup>th</sup> April (1977) when it provided 'two lively performances' at the talent show, where some 120 people enjoyed this and other turns including 'our very own international illusionist' – Bobby Voltaire. A couple of months earlier he had accurately predicted the Daily Express headline, the envelope in which this prediction was sealed, was opened at the show. Some £32 was raised for magazine funds too.

The **cover picture** of Maypole Dancing on The Green, was taken in the 1950's and "Rickatsons shop and 'The Green Man' can be seen in the background." Isn't it reassuring to note that this great tradition is still being continued by the school today as those who were at the Village Fete on 14<sup>th</sup> May experienced. It was just lovely.

On the **fete theme** - plans were well on the way for the 1977 Village Fete, to be opened by the Carnival Princess. Craft, plant, produce, sideshows and a dog show were to be enjoyed,



with competitions for children being age grouped poster making; a Silver Jubilee decorated bicycle and a Fancy Dress.

Before this, on 1<sup>st</sup> April, "**Members of St. Mary's School Choir** gave a talented display at the Parish Church ...... when they took part in a Musical Evening to raise funds for the Church Tower Restoration Fund. The programme had a Jubilee flavour". The choir sang thirteen songs, starting with 'The British Grenadiers' and both the recorder and violin groups played," with an excellent piano duet by Claire O'Connor and Mrs Mason ...... and the evening came to an exciting finale with the singing of 'Rule Britannia' by Mrs Roberts (Headmistress), accompanied by Mrs Mason on piano and Rev Cousins on the organ."

Back in 1977, good ol' 'Copperfield' played at **Darts Spring Buffet Dance** which also incorporated the finals of the Knockout competition where Keith Palmer represented the 'Rising Sun', Brian Pitt – the 'Compasses', Dennis Moss the 'Green Man', George Pitts the 'Flying Horse' and (the actual winner), Bob Woods from the 'Commander-in-Chief'.

Raising funds for the church Tower Restoration Fund, Ann Jeffrey and Fred Kirby organised their eighth Annual Spring Ball and made £120 and "A very pleasant Supper Party, held at The Old Rectory ....... by kind permission of Mr. & Mrs. Henman, raised £100 for the fund." (Forty-five years later, the church is still desperately in need of funds to maintain its fabric. Ah me - nothing changes on that front! What has changed though, is the number on the Church electoral roll – in 1977 there were 116, today some 40 fewer.)

Jack Pitts from the **Methodist Church** extended an invitation to the village via 'Correspondence'; "in Jubilee Year to **our very first Flower Festival**" to be held on 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> of May and "is to be arranged by Mrs Barbara Hudson". (I bet that was a stunner.) **Other social events** were advertised – a concert by the Luton Temple Salvation Army Songsters at St. Mary's Church – tickets 35p – and a 'Friendly Whist Drive at Beverley Court', or you could pop into Bedford to see 'The Eagle Has Landed' or to Luton for 'A Star is Born' or 'Zoltan-Hound of Dracula' (never heard of it!). The recipe is for Welsh cakes and there is more information on how to do deal with wounds and bleeding. (With a nose bleed, do you still "Sit with the head bent slightly forward. Breathe through the mouth. Pinch the nostrils firmly together for about ten minutes."?) Couldn't see anything from the Parish Council this month – perhaps no room, or too late in submission. (Does this happen nowadays?)

# Nature Notes: What to see in the hedgerows and verges.

In the Verges. The cow parsley fades, but look out for the taller hog-weed. It has a large flat head of small white flowers which attract insects. There are other similar flowers like wild carrots, blooming now.



There are many yellow flowers in our verges and waste-land. Apart from the occasional flowers the dandelions are over, but there are many others, often difficult to distinguish. We may know the sow-thistle, prickly and often found in other gardens. Among other yellow flowers blooming in high summer are hawkbit, cats' ears, jack-go-to bed by noon; such attractive names.

One of my favourite summer wild flowers is the scarlet pimpernel because of its bright red flowers, very small, but eye catching. This is another flower which only blooms in sun and will close in the afternoon.

Do not miss the comfrey with tall purple/white flowers opening in damp ground along the By Pass and in some parts of Clophill. You cannot miss the common mallow, it grows everywhere. Its small 5 petalled blooms are mauve, streaked with a darker hue. This often grows alongside red poppies and with some of the afore mentioned yellow flowers makes a lovely combination.

In the churchyard the ox-eye daisies (or marguerites) are out, and the purple knapweed, a striking plant.

**Trees.** They are all a full leaf now, and really all the same shade of heavy green. It is a good time to learn their different leaf shapes. The Lime trees on the Green come into flower- notice their beautiful scent. Also, near the Green on a fence, you may see some honeysuckle. An even heavier fragrance comes from the elder flower, which are in full bloom in June. Both they and the Lime blossom are teeming with insects.

**Birds.** During June, they are all still singing but they get quieter and the dawn chorus is over. The kites are soaring high, watch for their forked tails, or you may hear swifts screeching as they fly high above us.

**Other.** During a wet spell, lots of small toads are appearing (or frogs), I think toads are more common here. They walk, frogs jump, so I am told.

**High spots.** The elder blossom; it usually coincides with a heat wave, and the wild roses.



Hello everyone, what an exciting time we have been having here in Clophill and what a great Jubilee weekend the village put on. It was so lovely to get everyone together again after the success of the Church Fete.

It was great to be able to share our fantastic setting with so many families, some who come to us already, some who used



to and some who are hoping to join us. We are now full for 2022/2023 and taking bookings for 2023/24 and beyond. Its always fun to explain to people that we are



now an outdoor setting and that means we are outside all day every day; our children and staff have fully embraced this.

We always have people asking us what happens when it rains, and our answer is always the same... we get wet! All of our children are prepared for the weather, it's part of the commitment our parents make when they join us. Children come dressed in waterproofs everyday and are not bothered by the rain, they are busy playing and learning. It is important to us that children get to experience nature in all its guises through all the seasons, there is so much to learn from the world around us.

Since the new EYFS was introduced in September last year, we have gone on to develop our own curriculum based in nature that inspires children's natural curiosity and supports and auides them to learn through experience with a purpose. Their writing emerges as they write labels for the sunflower seeds they plant or draw treasure maps for their pirate



game, they use books and spotter cards to recognise and identify birds, plants, trees and bugs; sewing pictures of their favourites. They learned about bats, then drew them and made some out of clay, they examine features, and develop their fine motor skills and creativity. They develop their own ideas to make new sledges for the slope and then test out their ideas. They practice their maths as they count out the right number of cups of grain to feed Rocky and the girls and follow the pattern as they try maypole dancing. Recently one child's fascination for the solar system led to a group discussion about the planets, they then designed their own drawing on pebbles. By fostering children's natural interest in the world around them we find their fascination and learning is contagious.



We looking forward to this last half term of the summer, it is always busy and those leaving us for their step in next education really start spread their wings. We look forward to the schools visiting us to meet the children ioining them and this year our children will be voyaging on to 14 different settings. We have some

summer events to look forward to before then: sports day and dad's week as well as our end of term graduation and picnic, fun and busy times ahead!

Tony used a large selection of flowers including roses, carnations, lilies and lots of hydrangeas. He recommended using pot grown hydrangeas as they are cheaper but to immerse the blooms in water to keep them hydrated. To condition other cut flowers, he always singes the stems before plunging them

into deep water. There were alliums, stocks and chrysanthemums in other arrangements with lots of beautiful foliage.

All Tony's designs were traditional in style and large with two placements – one that he did on stage and

another he then brought on that he had created earlier. By the end of the evening the stage was spectacular filled with flowers and colour.

## Barton-le-Clay

#### Recent activity:

 Response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine – we had a moving presentation by the organisers of the Central Beds Ukraine Appeal, Emily Roberts from Barton and Kasha Southin from Clophill, who have long standing family ties with Ukraine and Poland.

Emily explained that once the invasion had started and the scale of the pending humanitarian crisis became apparent, the response from the local community has been almost overwhelming and we say a big thank you. Within a few days collection depots were established at Church Halls in Barton, Clophill and Maulden, with local hauliers delivering much needed relief supplies, at their own expense, to Collection Centres in Poland, a round trip of some 2,400 miles. Medical and healthcare supplies are now urgently required and in very short supply. Also, children's toys and games have been delivered to orphanages that have relocated to Poland with the team from Central Beds being enthusiastically received by the Ukrainian youngsters.

Funds raised, including from a rapidly organised quiz night at The Cross Keys in Pulloxhill, have been used to support the purchase of food sourced locally in Poland, eliminating the need for expensive haulage.

Emphasis is now shifting to supporting incoming refugees and their host families in Central Beds.

The Club, along with Rotary in Ampthill, have actively supported this local Relief effort and will continue to work with the Appeal in raising funds and supplying support. Any support is welcome.

- The Club continues to support our established international projects, including CARE International's "Lend with Care" programme, which matches entrepreneurs in the developing world with donors who can provide low-cost micro loans to help establish or expand their local businesses. The Club has now supported the programme for eight years:
  - contributing to over 600 micro-loans supporting over 3,000 emerging entrepreneurs creating over 2,000 jobs
  - Countries include Cambodia, Ecuador, Peru, Malawi, Nicaragua, Pakistan, Vietnam and Zambia.
