Come into the Garden

With Kate Gardner

It was great to see so many people visiting our wonderful Clophill Gardens during the Open Gardens weekend. Visiting gardens is a great way to gain ideas for your own patch and there is plenty of evidence that just being out in the garden is good for our health and wellbeing.



There are plenty of jobs to think about over the summer, as Spotlight takes a break until September; so this time I've concentrated on things that we can do to keep our gardens full of colour through what I hope will be a warm summer. If you have been growing in pots then keep giving them a weekly feed of a comfrey, nettle or tomato feed to encourage plenty of new flowers. Part 2 of the growing in pots will follow in September when we look at what to grow into the autumn and winter. In the meantime, sowing little and often will keep you in edibles over the summer.

Some of my favourite plants are at their best during July. Delphiniums, Agapanthus, lavender various Clematis, Achillea, Nepeta, late flowering Peonies, Day Lily, Roses, Sweet peas and Honeysuckle are all blooming and the garden is full of beautiful scents. To keep summer plants and bedding at its best and to prolong flowering, it is essential to dead head. The purpose of dead heading is to encourage more flowers. If the flower heads are left on, then the plant switches to seed production and is then very reluctant to flower again. Dead heading, which is cutting off the spent flower head, forces the plant back into the cycle to produce flowers again. Cut the spent flower off just above a leaf node which is where your new flowers will break from.

For some plants, it can be easier to take the shears to the top growth and very often a second growth and flush of flowers will follow, as with Alchemilla mollis and hardy geraniums. This looks drastic but is a great way of rejuvenating these plants.

Early flowering perennials can begin to look a bit tired by July and their foliage is becoming tatty and brown. If these plants are cut back now, many will produce fresh green growth to liven up the border and sometimes even a second flush of flowers. Good candidates for this treatment are Oriental poppies, Alchemilla, hardy geraniums, and Nepeta. Cut back close to the ground, feed and wait a couple of weeks. It can look a bit bare when you first to this but the new growth will soon fill the space.

Now is also a good time to prune early summer-flowering shrubs such as philadelphus, flowering current and weigela after they've blossomed, so they can put on new growth this year that will hold the flowers next summer. As well as cutting back for shape, look for any damaged or dead shoots and cut them out.

There's still time to plant summer bulbs for very late flowers. Try gladioli with deep colours including dark purple Gladiolus 'Espresso' or the beautiful Gladiolus communis subsp. byzantinus with its magenta flowers.

And this month is the perfect time to plant bulbs that will bring colour in autumn; for instance, Autumn crocus, amaryllis and nerine will flower in September and October. The nerines are particularly welcome as they have all the brightness of the early summer blooms with their blasts of pink and white and can make a real difference to the garden as winter draws in.

And finally, now the lawn if it's not parched and, if it's looking tired, July is the last opportunity to apply a summer fertiliser. If it's dry you may need to water it into your lawn.

Our Value for July is: Courage and Confidence

In school, we try to link our values to key events during the year; sometimes the Church calendar and at other times, related to school life. Our Y4 children are all moving on to new schools and the children within the school are moving to new classes. It is a challenging time for all of them and so 'Courage' seems an appropriate value to study at this time. We hope that the children will be able to approach their new challenges with confidence, and be able to articulate and understand their feelings at this emotional time. We will consider how to overcome fears by being with and confiding in other people, friends and family. Nothing is ever as frightening when you are not alone. We will look at examples of people who have shown courage and reflect on times when we have been brave, examining how that made us feel. It is important that we stress that bravery doesn't just relate to physical feats but also to daily words and actions such as being honest and owning up to something, even when you know you will be in trouble, or standing up for what you know is right even when others might be against you.

At home, you could discuss our thought for the month' with your children and decide what you think it means:

'Sometimes the biggest act of courage is a small one.'

This month, as a family, you could have a go at doing something reasonably challenging and see it through to the end; it could be something like jumping into a swimming pool for the first time, having a shot at ice skating or removing stabilisers from a bike. Encourage your children to be honest about their fears and try to overcome them bravely and confidently together.


Trustees serve a term of four years after which they can be re-elected.

Thomas Dearman's Charity (Now part of Clophill United Charities)

Thomas Dearman died in 1630 and is buried in Old St Mary's churchyard. In his will he left "2 acres and 2 allotments of 6a, 3r, 29p and 1a, 3r, 2p". The rent from this land was to be used "For the benefit of poor labourers not receiving parish relief".

This is the epitaph written on the gravestone of Thomas Dearman in a quaint manner. (The gravestone has since been lost.)

Clophill's Serving Survivors of WW1


Continuing our series in celebration of Clophill's brave men who fought in and survived the first world war...

John Sheppard was born in 1887, one of 11 children born to Market Gardener David and his wife Lucy. The family lived in the High Street. John married Kate Roberts in 1913 and was called up in 1918 when he had a thriving Market Gardening business and a young family. He joined the Staffordshire Regiment but developed Meningitis later in 1918 and was dangerously ill. He recovered slowly and was demobbed in 1919. His wife died in 1938 and in 1939 John was living in Simpson's Hill (just to the west of the A6 garage) with his 2 daughters and they all worked as agricultural labourers. John died in 1941 and is buried at the Old Church with his wife.

Ernest Shotbolt was born in 1891 – son of Mary Ann. It is believed that Mary had 8 children. He was a Private in the 2nd/4th Royal Scots Fusiliers. He joined in June 1916. After training in the UK he was declared medically unfit and because of ill health invalided out of the service in March 1918.

He lived at 4 Barton Cottages, High Street, Clophill in 1911 and was a Farm Labourer. The head of the household was his Step Father, James Page, a 62-year-old Police Pensioner. James had been married to Ernest's mother, Mary Ann for 4 years. Ernest had also been married to James's daughter, Grace for 1 year. So not only was Ernest James's Stepson but he was also his son-in-law. Also residing at the house were Ernest's brother, Walter (see below), a farm Labourer and James Edward (an infant), the son of Ernest and Grace. Ernest died in 1924.

Walter Shotbolt - brother of Ernest above, was born in 1894. He was a farm labourer. He joined the Grenadier Guards in 1915 and so was awarded the star medal. He married Ethel Sheppard in London in 1917. At the time of his marriage Walter states that his father is Arthur Shotbolt, (deceased) а veterinary surgeon, however his mother has stated in every Census that she was single.



In his military papers it is stated that he now lives in Ripley, Derbyshire and had been working as a Collier. Ampthill news reported several times on Arthur- In 1915 "Pte. Shotbolt, of the Coldstream Guards, has written home stating that a shell burst near the trench he was in, and he was buried in the debris. His ears are affected, and he is at present in hospital at Rouen." Then in 1916 that he had written to his brother Ernest, that he has returned to the trenches. Later in 1916 the paper says no news has been received of Walter, for several weeks. It is believed that he had been a Prisoner of War during 1918. Walter was demobbed in 1920. By 1939 he and Ethel were living in Wimbledon with their daughter and he was a Police Officer. He died aged 79 in Merton, London.

A S Simpson was a Corporal in the 1st Queen's (Royal Surrey Regiment). He joined in April 1917 and in March 1918 he was despatched to France. He saw service at Albert and Le Cateau. He was also engaged on clerical duties with the Royal Army Ordnance Corps at GHQ at Wimereux and Boulogne. He was demobilised in April 1920 and he received the General Service Medal and the Victory Medal. He lived at High Street, Clophill. This is probably Alfred Simpson but nothing further is known for certain.

Frederick Simpson was born in Clophill in 1885. The family lived on the High Street. At the age of 15 he was living as a boarder and working as a "sizer" in Rushden. By 1911 he was working as a tailor in Peterborough, living with his future wife Madeline Sharman and her father. In 1919 Ampthill News reported that he had been home to visit his father (thought to be William Harwood, husband of Sarah née Simpson) and was in billets east of Cologne and was still working as a regimental tailor. It is believed that he died in 1933 but nothing further is certain.

As we operate a Pre School at the hall on most days of the week, the successful applicant will have to be willing to undergo a basic CRB check which will be funded by the Village Hall.

Reflections – Clophill in April 1977 - Voices from the past

Continuing our series looking back at previous issues of Spotlight and Clophill Village life... By Julie Benson



This very topical cover photo from June 1977, shows "a fancy-dress parade, a decorated bicycle and the Union Flag prominently displayed. We believe the photograph was taken shortly after the First World War, probably as part of the victory celebrations, however on this point we are uncertain. We thank Mrs Tufnell for the use of the photograph, together with the residents whose photos have appeared on other recent editions." This was the 'Cover Picture' write-up and first article of the magazine.

Following this, details of "our first ever Holiday Photograph Competition" are announced. There were to be two categories – 'Most Amusing Holiday Photograph', the winner to "receive free admission for two persons at any Luton or Bedford cinemas" and 'Most

Impressive Holiday Photograph', the winner to be "taken on a guided tour of a photographic processing unit, by courtesy of Kodak".

Of course, this was Jubilee year - her Majesty's Silver - so all things Jubilee were advertised (does this remind you if anything more recent?). At the Summer Fete there was to be a Fancy dress competition (3 age groups), entrants to join the float procession; a Silver Jubilee Decorated Bicycle (2 age groups) and a poster competition (3 age groups). Also, in April "eight girls competed for the coveted title of 'Carnival Princess 1977' Those taking part were Adrienne Gardiner, Shanette Telford, Clare Gee, Karen Sizeland, Linda Howell, Donna Dobrowloski, Elizabeth Brennan and Bryony Brown". Shanette won, with Bryony and Donna as "maids of honour on the Jubilee float which will lead the procession to the fete". (I well remember helping to decorate many a fete float for the school along with Carolyn Cranswick and Carol Whysall back in the day). Other exciting Jubilee events were planned "Win a Jubilee Doll – make a list of as many words as possible from the letters in SILVER JUBILEE- and the lucky winner will receive a beautifully dressed Jubilee Doll valued at £2; a children's Disco on 1st July and on 2nd July - a Silver Jubilee Dance, with tickets @ £1.75 including buffet.

A Fete Committee fundraising Sponsored walk had taken place in Wrest Park on 15th May when "twenty walkers battled away in an attempt to win one of the two awards for raising the most money for the fund".

Now, here are some of the walkers you might recognise: Raymond Alford, Jane and Mark Ashton, Phillip Barratt, Donna and Lee Beatty, Jackie and Sarah Eaton, Adam, Jane and Janet Latchford. Elizabeth Lawrence. Jonathan McGrath. Gavin Selth and Tim Sheppard.

An extra half-page slip was entitled 'Little Lane Jubilee Street Party'



and it gave an account of this lovely day which saw adults and children resident in Great Lane, the central part of the High Street and The Causeway, enjoying sports for all in the garden of Mrs Edwards (6, Little Lane). "To complete the sporting activity, Little Lane and Great Lane proved their superiority over the High Street, by winning both the children's and father's Tug O'War. Tea was now waiting, mountains of sandwiches, cakes, sausages, crisps, ice cream and jellies, prepared by Mrs Baldwin, Mrs S. Myers and Mrs Betty Hampson. The Rector sang grace, and undaunted by two showers, everyone enjoyed a delicious meal.



The Lane was decorated with flags and the sixty or so children received jubilee paper crowns made by Mrs Sizeland, Smarties were given by Mr & Mrs Sharp and lollipops by Mrs Stokes". Now doesn't that iust resonate with the wonderful Jubilee afternoon and weekend we enjoyed over June 4th and 5th?






