



# Come into the Garden

The last month or so has been one of the most challenging times for gardening in a long time but the recent rain has certainly helped revive some of the plants and fill the water butts too.



One of the easiest ways to add early spring colour is to sow some hardy annuals directly into gaps in your garden. As you weed or remove plants that didn't survive the summer, mix some compost into the soil, and then thinly sow the seeds, rake so they are lightly covered and remember to add a label, so you don't weed them out!! There are lots to choose from including cornflower, poppy, larkspur, poached egg plant, snap dragons, and marigold. If you want a mix of plants, then many of the seed companies are offering mixed packets of butterfly and bee friendly seeds.

If you have been growing in pots, then you might have noticed that the edges of the plants have been nibbled or have suddenly died. It's very possible that you have Vine Weevils. The white grubs will eat the roots and the adults (all female) will eat the leaves while laying eggs in the soil. The only way to solve the issue is to use nematodes in the pots to break the life cycle and now is the best time of year to apply them.

If you want something edible then its not too late to sow varieties of winter lettuce, oriental greens such as Pak choi, winter spinach and spring onions. These will all grow very happily in pots in a sheltered spot or cold greenhouse and will enable you to add fresh greens to your meals through the winter months. You can still get hold of plug plants of leeks and some of the loose leaved kales and these will also grow well in containers. You will just need to protect the cabbages from the pigeons with some fleece.

Now is also the best time of year to divide those early flowering perennials. The following is a list of those that would benefit from this. Agapanthus, Anemone, Aster, Bergenia (elephant's ears), lily-of-the-valley, Crocosmia, Delphinium, Epimedium, hardy Geranium, daylily, Hosta, and primula.

Lift plants gently with a garden fork, working outwards from the crown's centre to limit root damage. Shake off excess soil so that roots are clearly visible. Some plants, such as Ajuga (bugle), produce individual plantlets which can simply be teased out and replanted. Small, fibrous-rooted plants such as Heuchera, Hosta and Epimedium can be lifted and pulled apart gently. This should produce small clumps for replanting. Large, fibrous-rooted perennials, such as daylily, require two garden forks inserted into the crown back-to-back. Use these as levers to loosen and break the root mass into two sections, before dividing them into smaller clumps.

Plant them as soon as possible and water them in well. They can either be replanted in the same area, taking the opportunity to mix in a little garden compost or other soil improver first, or moved to a new part of the garden. Alternatively, pot up individually to build up size, overwinter them somewhere sheltered and then they can be shared with friends and neighbours or replanted somewhere else in the spring.

This has been a challenging summer but with a little planning and preparation our gardens will look fabulous all year round.

(Meeting held on 27<sup>th</sup> July 2022)

Volunteer of the Month - The Chairmans Fund.





Julie Benson was presented with the certificate for June's award, for all her untiring work across multiple groups and charities within the village, including CUC, St Mary's Church, Clophill Community Care and Spotlight.

Steve Rodell also caught up with our busy April nominee's, Kat Southin and Emily Roberts (picture below), to present them with their awards and see the

ambulance they have raised funds for and just sent to Ukraine.

We encourage all parishioners to nominate individuals who have contributed to the village in a voluntary capacity. There is no age limit on the award. Please email the clerk@clophill-pc.gov.uk.

The purpose of Clophill Parish Council's Chairman's Fund ("the Fund") is to foster and promote community spirit by rewarding examples of community-oriented behaviours, thereby enabling:



- a) Improved wellbeing by reminding people to be on the look-out for unsolicited acts of kindness, generosity, etc.;
- b) Improved recognition and appreciation of people who contribute to village life.

**In the public session** a member of CAUSE spoke to the meeting on their concerns with the proposed 38 new houses on the land adjacent to the current Hayfield Homes development. These included overlooking issues, loss of hedge rows, and ecology. They also requested the possibility of a public meeting.

#### Other items:

- 1. An update was provided on the petition for the 30 mile per hour reduction in speed limit off of the A6 roundabout and removal of the bridge. 436 signatures were gathered and delivered to CBC. These were disallowed, as no addresses were given. After a further huge push 240 addresses were added, and the petition was delivered on 2<sup>nd</sup> August to the CBC executive meeting.
- The Neighbourhood Plan is now moving forward with the return of the Green infrastructure Plan. Consultation dates with the village will be released shortly, and are likely to be in September.
- 3. New benches have been installed at the green and the recreation ground for the enjoyment of the village.

# **Nature Notes:**

## What to see in the hedgerows and verges.

August has come and gone as is usual without our "Spotlight". The swifts have gone; you may have seen a few this year in Clophill. The cuckoo won't be heard



again until next April, I heard him this year over the Cainhoe Castle hills.

When the garden birds (which have deserted us for their moult) come back, they will find plenty of food in our hedgerows. You cannot miss the bright red haws, fruit of the hawthorn (or May). Some of the earliest berries are the purplish, black elderberries, pinch the elder leaves to sniff their distinctive odour.

The brambles will have been full of blossom in July and August, so now is the time to go blackberrying. The blackthorn of early spring blossom has now produced its small black sloe berries and you may see in our hedgerows some small yellow plums.

There is little bird song but the robin is marking his territory with a rather melancholy song, and there are a few twitterings at first.

Don't miss the sweet chestnuts along the A6, in their prickly cases. And don't be fooled by the brown horse chestnut tree in late summer; they appear to change colour very early but not to the lovely buttery yellow many of us remember; they are now looking as if they have been burnt to an unhealthy crisp: caused by disease. We still have the lime trees on the Green and they are the first to change colour, the oak trees the last.

In the verges many summer flowers are still blooming. Some we may have missed earlier are Herb Robert, a very low growing plant with reddish aromatic leaves: it grows near the Aldwyk houses.

If you drive along the Western Bypass, you will have seen the beautiful blue scabious and amongst these are yellow, fluffy, ladies bedstraw. They have a lovely scent if you can find it somewhere accessible. Another later flowering plant is the lesser celandine not a bit like the winter celandine. This one can be found on the church wall, it can stain your hands yellow and is best left alone. Silver weed is interesting and quite common, its leaves are ferny and silvery, its flowers yellow small and cup shaped. I once read the Romans put their leaves inside their sandals as they marched; to keep their feet cool. Trust me it doesn't work!!

September and October are the months for fungi. We have the fairy toadstool, red with white spots in our garden. Beware of fungi unless you are an expert! September can be peak time for wasps attacking our picnics; perhaps they (like us) really need a sugar rush. So, let us live and let live whenever we can.

Highlights. All the berries and the changing leaves.

# Clophill's Serving Survivors of WW1

Continuing our series in celebration of Clophill's brave men who fought in and survived the first world war...

Frederick George Skipwith lived at "The Gables", High Street, Clophill. He was born in Wokingham in 1870. He was the son of Sir Grey Skipwith (a baron) and Fanny Elizabeth Tudor. He was educated at Wellington college, Berkshire. Frederick married Bertha Sylvia Chapman, an American, in Illinois in 1903. He fought in the Sudan Campaign in 1898 (the year he also became a Freemason) and in the Boer War. He also fought in the First World War, where he was mentioned in dispatches. He gained the rank of Colonel in the 1st Battalion, Royal Warwickshire Regiment.

He was made Companion, Order of St. Michael and St. George (C.M.G.) in 1919. Also, in 1919 he returned to Clophill briefly due to an accident involving his wife-he later returned to Germany. The couple lived at The Gables from at least 1914 to 1926.

At the unveiling of Clophill memorial, it was reported that "Colonel Skipwith, C.M.G., who saw considerable active service with the Warwickshires, said that when war was ruthlessly forced upon us by Germany, the men of Clophill, who had previously lived a peaceful country life, went out to fight in the most gigantic and terrible struggle the world had



ever known, and to face horrors which those who had not been to the front could not possibly imagine. How they acquitted themselves would stand in history. By their self-sacrifice they were instrumental in removing that menace which had been steadily growing and over-shadowing the peace of Europe, and ever becoming a menace to our very existence as a country. They fought and died as heroes for the glory of old England, and the loyalty of anxious ones at home was a fitting background to the glorious heroism of those fighting in the line. It was the duty of the living to those who were now dead to see that Germany never again attained a position in which she could threaten the peace of the world."

Bertha died in 1944 at which time their address was given as the Corbett Arms Hotel, Merionethshire.

He was married again aged 84 to Nora (died 1958), in 1954. He died in 1964 in Hove at age 93, without issue.

**Charles Smith** was the son of Sarah Ann Lomas (née Smith). He was born in Haynes in about 1886 and was probably half-brother to fellow survivor- Jack Lomas. The family lived at Mount Pleasant (now Back Street). Charles was a farm labourer and enlisted with the Bedfordshires in 1915 and was a Private in the London Yeomanry. Nothing further is known about Charles.

Frederick Hargreaves Smith was born in 1869 in Lancashire and had been a Major in the army at the turn of the century. He married Elizabeth Hamilton in 1900 and they went on to have 2 children. By 1915 until at least 1919 his address was Clophill House, High Street. During WW1 he was a Major in the Army service Corps. His other occupation was given as "artist." The couple lived for some time in Kent. In the 1930s he travelled to Australia and America. He died in Jersey in 1955.

On a warm July evening we enjoyed the inaugural visit of Beverley Short who had made the journey from Shakespeare country to entertain us with the appropriately titled "A Touch of Summer". It was indeed a balmy evening - a nice respite from



another day of barmy British politics dominating the news!

Much of the earlier chatter was about our own news, many people were still talking about the 45 +1-year anniversary dinner of the previous month, which was a great success! And talking of success, another topic of conversation was the news that our member Linda O'Toole had gained a first and second prize, and runner-up in Best in Show, in the National Virtual show "Chasing Rainbows"; this is an amazing achievement – really well-done Linda!

Beverley regaled us with stories about her recent cruise up the Amazon - fantastic sightings of sloths, dolphins, a tarantula, and of giant waterlilies - not all in the same

Members enjoyed her six presentations, which included memories of Beverley's time in Australia at the time of the fires in 2019 - twisted willow on a black trellis, combined with palm leaves and burnt forest colours of fire red gerberas, protea and burnt orange roses, evoking the raging fires and sad destruction which was heart-breaking to see at first hand.

Another design was three placements on a trellis using purple liatris and statis, with lime green Chrysanths to illustrate the Wimbledon colours!

The fifth arrangement of blue delphiniums and yellow roses in a tall blue vase was very striking.

Beverley commented on the current discussions at national level regarding the use of non-biodegradable floral foam versus other methods of support for flower arranging, none of which are totally satisfactory. No real replacement for foam is available on the market just yet and foam is not allowed for use in the big national shows. Quite a problem for the future of flower arranging as we know it today.

At the end of the evening members came back into the real world, wondering how many more government ministers had resigned whilst we were watching the show! Was this all "Much ado about Nothing", or "A Comedy of Errors"?

# Reflections – Clophill in July and August 1977 Voices from the past

Continuing our series looking back at previous issues of Spotlight and Clophill Village life... By Julie Benson

Just as now, there was no specific August 'Outlook' 45 years ago. It gives the brilliant staff and the 'deliverers' a rest for a few weeks. So, what does the July / August Magazine 1977 tell us of the activities that went on in June? They are all a month 'late' in reporting of course.

The **cover picture**, taken from the church tower, probably in the 1920's and 'kindly supplied by Mrs A. Izzard', is of the junction of Little Lane, Great Lane and the High Street. "It shows houses which have been modernised and others which no longer stand today. It shows a school which now faces demolition and The Causeway as country land with poplar tree reaching up into the skyline. Let us think today what will be left of this



attractive country scene in a few years' time" (ah me – we don't need to think, we know!).

**The Parish Council** have planted trees and put a fence in the Village Hall grounds as part of the Jubilee project – and after handing out commemorative mugs to all children; there was a surplus of about 60 and they were for purchase at 45p each. Interestingly "A public meeting is to be held in October with representatives of the District and County Councils to arouse interest in the conservation area". This is one to follow!

The Village Fete was a great success (nothing changes there then). The float procession was led by the Carnival Queen, who then opened the fete. The fancy dress competition had prizes won by (3-6 years) Helen, Erica and Francis Grant who were dressed as Beefeaters; Stuart Armitage who came as a clown and by lan Bousted – the Lollipop Man. The 7-11 year category saw Robert Warner winning as a Bottle of Guinness; Michael Page as a gypsy and Elizabeth Broker as Wa Sing Chinese Laundry; while in the 'Pairs', winners Joanne Constance and Francis Wood were dressed as 'The Owl and the Pussy Cat'; Claire O'Connor and Joanne Hudson - Clophill Shoe Shiners and Justine Hudson and Catherine Damby were a ballet duet. The very high standard of decorated bicycles, saw Susan and David Errick and Amanda Parker winning the 5-9 years and Carole Jeffcoate, Malcolm Barker the 10-13 years. The poster competition saw budding artists Adrian Farr, Rachel Naylor and Helen Trudgill winning the 5-9 years and Adrienne Gardiner, Joanne Constance and Patsy Barker the 10 – 15 years.

The Dog Show, regarded as pre-Crufts, was once again a great draw and the traditional pub Tug-O'-War was won by 'The Compasses' with 'The Rising Sun' as runners up. Among the seventeen drawn prizes a continental quilt was won by Mr Clare; G. Long - an electric knife; Mrs Henman - a Dinner for Two; Hampson – bottle of sherry and R. Speake – 4 bottles of lager while F.W. Young also won 4 bottles of lager and a 50p voucher! (you might have noticed that I love the range of the prizes; and of course remembering many who have won them). Amongst other prizes for other draws 'an oven ready chicken, talcum powder, a portable radio and a model boat kit' were won (times have changed).

The **WI** was busy. Mrs Warner beat Mrs Everitt in the darts final and was presented with a trophy by the WI President Mrs Janet Myers. Janet also gave trophies to Mrs Everitt and the runners up, Mrs Errick and Mrs Hampson. At the July meeting "The Drama sub-committee has been formed" (such a shame that it has all folded). The Church Summer Fayre raised funds for the Church tower restoration fund with sideshows of 'the stocks', 'Put out the flame' (can't remember what that's about), 'Ball in the jar' and 'Coin in the bucket' (perhaps these should be reinstated next year!).

The **Flower Club** held their annual flower show, themed this year on the Silver Jubilee. In the children's category there were 9 winners; E. C. and R. Naylor, Joanne Hudson, Sarah Gibbs, Claire Cranswick, J. Clarke, L. Nation and Juliette Gordon. The **Guides** enjoyed a camping weekend at 'Windysayles'; the **Methodist Church** was busy with Sunday School Anniversary services, a tea and coffee evening at the home of Mr & Mrs Bernard Sharp and a successful Jumble Sale. "**The 'Stone Jug'** is to be re-opened by a new licensee" (that was the one before Arthur as he - and his super family - came in 1981).



# Claphill Preschall News

Hello everyone, welcome back to a new year at Clophill Preschool and our tenth year since opening! We hope you all enjoyed a fun and safe summer.

We hosted our Sports Day on a Saturday this year which meant we had an even more fantastic turn out than ever. Children moved around the setting testing their skills as they climbed and jumped, balanced and swung their way through the activities. Then came the running races; from children to parents to staff and the day was rounded off with hotdogs and cold drinks. Our summer term ended in

style with a bit of a musical extravaganza. We hosted our leaver's graduation usual picnic, our children brilliantly performed sonas with confidence and then it was the staff's turn much to everyone's delight! Animal Edge Farm joined us and all of the children and their families were invited to join us for a sunny afternoon chatting and relaxing together.



Over the summer we have held our Stay and Play sessions which have been packed each time. As usual we have been behind the scenes developing the setting for the coming year. We would like to thank Clophill Charities for their kind donation as well as Angela Barker, Andy and Julia and the Village Hall Committee who have all made contributions to help us improve the setting.

We are starting this term with lots of new children and their families joining us and have been developing our nature-based curriculum further. Our children will have the opportunity to do lots of planting and growing independently alongside our allotment. They have been using the new Perspex painting board to great



effect and can explore clay work, drawing and sewing. We are introducing more cookery using food from the land making wild garlic scones and other yummy foods. Children are learning to identify plants, trees, animals, and insects, they learn what is safe to touch and what to stay away from. We are developing their language further with more story times, singing and opportunities for conservation and discussion.

Our ethos has always been about really listening to the children and engaging with them, it is so important to actually listen to what they are saying and help develop their conversational skills and language. It is very important to give each child a voice.
