# **Come into the Garden**

There used to be a school of thought that resulted in us 'putting the garden to bed' during the winter months. What was often left was a garden devoid of colour or shape where every plant had been severely pruned and the boarders were left bare. While you may not want to go outside and walk on



the grass or soil in case you damage the soil structure when it's very wet, containers planted up with a selection of foliage and flowers can brighten all areas, giving colour and interest over the cold season. Although these plants are not as flamboyant as those used in summer containers, you can still make a statement with careful plant selections.

Preparation is the key so here are some practical steps to follow to make sure that you get the most from your planters. Plants grow very little in winter so make sure you start with good-sized plants and use sufficient numbers of plants for the size of container to make an impact from the start.

Position your container where it will get as much light as possible during the winter months to ensure plant foliage remains green and healthy. Raise your containers off the ground on pot feet or bricks to aid drainage and help prevent the freezing conditions that cause pots to crack. Make sure to choose frost-proof terracotta or containers made of plastic, fibreglass or wood. Bubble wrap containers in severe weather to reduce damage to plant roots.

It is not necessary to feed container plants during the winter but you will need to check the compost regularly and water carefully as compost can dry out quickly in mild weather. Part of the fun of creating pots and containers is that you can put plant combinations together that you may not find work in the summer. One of my favourites is to pair the glossy, evergreen foliage of black **Ophiopogon planiscapus** 'Nigrescens' with the pale greens of the cornus. Add some snowdrops into the mix and some variegated trailing Ivy to soften to edges of the pot.

Wooden or plastic troughs can be planted up with a range of perennials and small shrubs providing flowers, scent, seed heads, berries and more. Skimmia japonica 'Rubella', Gaultheria procumbens, Bergenia cordifolia, Erica carnea 'Springwood White', Viburnum tinus, Euonymus fortunei and eryngium will give instant impact and can be transplanted into your boarders come the spring.

For a real splash of colour why not try carmine **Cyclamen** alongside the more muted **Carex** Evergold and **skimmia japonica**. A miniature ivy allowed to tumble over helps to soften any hard edges. Once the cyclamen is over it can be replaced with some mini daffodils or tulips. If you would prefer something muted then why not try winter-flowering hellebores, such as **Helleborus niger** and combine it with a variegated holly such as **ilex aquifolium** Silver Queen to complement the white flowers.

If you have a sheltered spot near to a door, then I would seriously recommend planting up a couple of outstanding winter scented plants. Hammamelis is a striking plant that bears yellow and orange flowers along its bare branches. They have thin, spidery petals and a rich scent. It needs acidic soil but does grow happily in containers. Chimonanthus praecox is a woody shrub with striking yellow flowers along its branches. The blooms are cup-shaped and hang down, releasing their intoxicating fragrance. It is fully hardy but likes a sheltered spot.

Miniature Iris are so delicate and ideal for containers. But it's their gentle scent that makes them so great for winter gardens. Try Iris reticulate or Iris unguicularis for elegant purple and blue flowers.

In September we told you that we had gained the Eco-Church Bronze Award for our efforts to protect the environment. I am pleased to report that we have now received the silver award. For this we were required to re-evaluate various aspects of our church life in worship and teaching, management of building and land, community, global engagement and lifestyle. This is judged by the environment organisation, A Rocha. We have much to do to achieve the gold award, but we plan to tackle this early next year. Our support for the new Village Hall Hub and our Winter Warmer lunches helped to enhance our submission for the silver award.

The lunches of homemade soup with bread are held on Thursdays from 12 noon and morph into Community Care's Leisure Club from 2 o'clock. All are welcome regardless of personal circumstances. We'd love to see you there!

#### Reflections – Clophill in December 1977 Voices from the past

# Continuing our series looking back at previous issues of Spotlight and Clophill Village life... *By Julie Benson*

You might well wonder why I spend time pouring over past copies of 'Outlook' (and enjoying every memory), the pre-runner of 'Spotlight'- and giving you a very brief summary of their contents? I suppose it's to remind folk who remember Clophill 45 years ago (hence lots of names & raffle prizes – how they have changed) and to let you newer (and very welcome) residents of how vibrant the village was then and how central 'Outlook' was. I have to leave out lots of info about the football and netball clubs; 'Sid's Scene' - a resumé of recent record releases; 'Screen scene' - info about films being shown locally: 'Junior Outlook' (speaks for itself) and recipes for example. The magazine was representative of (and encompassed) all that was going on in the village – and of course, was the way in which information was disseminated before our age of the internet and Grapevine. Barry Inskip was the editor (and I am pretty sure might have also been 'Sid' and film and train timetable researcher) plus a team of typists who used 'skins' to put on a 'Banda machine' (which was kept in the church) to duplicate. I am thinking that the cover was printed externally and then Barry inserted and stapled the magazine, before handing out 300 or so copies @7p per copy to be distributed by a willing band of volunteers – who, although perhaps not the same people, are still today so vital and so much appreciated.



As to the cover of the December 1977 issue - well, your guess is as mine! There's good as no explanation as to what this happy gathering photograph on Outlook represents - or when it was taken. It looks a bit like a pantomime cast - perhaps a 'Music Hall' evening; there's a 'wedding party' on the front row and the placard reads 'NO WORK, NO DOLE, NO RELIEF', perhaps it's a further part of the

post war celebrations? They all look like youngsters – apart from the audience to the side. Looking into the magazine, the **Parish Council** outlined their main expenses for 1978 – Village Hall - £400, New bus shelter - suggested that it should be coloured brick with a slab roof, to protect people from the west wind but not to have dark corners at night - £500; Street lights - £300 and burial ground, including new gates - £650. It was noted that the "District Council is studying whether the **Box factory** in Old Silsoe Road is being used in the way described in the original planning application."

Also, there was a plea for somebody to come forward to run a Youth Club. The Village Hall Management Committee welcomed Mrs Gill Jones as the new booking secretary and were pleased that track had been erected for new stage lighting, for which six lights were on order, also dates for future events were decided.

Now, you know that 'Home Brew' has featured quite a lot, and it does again in December's issue. How about this? They played at a dance at Hunting Engineering "when they earned the praise of Acker Bilk who had to follow shouts of 'More, more!' from an audience who kept the jazz star waiting, whilst 'Home Brew' took the dance by storm. He said "Next time I play with 'Home Brew' they better not play so good!" What a compliment eh?

Back here in Clophill, the Methodist Church held a concert by the Bedford Congress Hall Band of the Salvation Army; the Guides entertained the Brownies with a series of sketches and Katy Bousted, Joanne Constance, Catherine Taylor, Luisa and Mirella Dolente and Jan Whittles were enrolled. At another meeting, the Brownies raised money via a sponsored silence and entered a team: Claire Cranswick, Elizabeth Brooker, Helen Trudgill and Carolyn Jones for the Road Safety quiz.

Beverley Court held a very successful Christmas Fair (the raffle having 18 prizes) the first of which was a turkey. The Darby & Joan Christmas Draw had 71 prizes which included a brace of pheasants, Champagne, several Christmas puds, nine bottles of sherry, 6 x 'groceries', handkerchiefs, coffee and sugar, toiletries; and a cuddly toy!

## Our Value for December is: Justice (Equality)

We will also talk about the fact that everyone deserves equal rights and we will think about some of the rights that children have. Along with these rights, we will also consider the responsibility that comes with these – understanding how we should be treated but then also how we should treat others too.

At home, you may wish to discuss the concepts of Justice and Equality when the phrase, "it's not fair!" crops up, with children again understanding how decisions might be made in order to make things, in fact, fair and equal for everyone!

It's also good to identify things that are special about ourselves and others. You could do this within your family, reinforcing that diversity should always be celebrated and, again, that Justice and Equality applies to <u>everyone</u>, regardless of our amazing differences.

## **Clophill's Serving Survivors of WW1**

Continuing our series in celebration of Clophill's brave men who fought in and survived the first world war...

**David Yeo Bartholomew Tanqueray** lived on the High Street and was a Captain in the King's Royal Rifles. He was born in Totnes, Devon on 20 Aug 1896 and had one older brother, Andrew and an older sister, Margaret. His father, Andrew Hawkins Tanqueray was born in Tingrith on 3 Feb 1864. David's mother was Alice Lucy Cory. Andrew senior was a brewer in Ampthill and then in Totnes before becoming the owner of a Mechanical Engineering Company, when the family lived in Finchley. Although Andrew appears on the 1910 electoral role for Finchley, none of the family appears on the 1911 Census.

David was posted to France on 20 May 1915 as a 2nd Lieutenant in the 9th Battalion of the KRR. On his record his address in 1921 is given as Ivy House, Clophill.

Also on his record are the words "Vologda Force" and NREF. So it is likely that David served in the North Russian Expeditionary Force, an adventure that was not a success. He was awarded the 1914-



15 Star, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. At some stage he moved to the Peterborough area and with others he was involved in the patenting of a laundry ironing machine. He travelled widely and visited New York twice and Quebec. The manifest on the ships lists him as a Director, and he must have been wealthy in that he travelled First Class, including on the Queen Mary.

David married Marjorie Edith Bryant in March 1938, although some records indicate that her surname may have been McDonald. In 1938 David & Marjorie travelled to Southampton from Durban on the Windsor Castle. They had 2 children. David was born in 1939 and Davina in 1941.

In 1941 David registered a patent in Canada as an inventor of an automatic washing machine control! They were then living at The Old Vicarage, Helpston, Peterborough. David died at the age of 47 in West End Hospital, Regent's Park, London on 21 March 1944.

**Frederick George Tanqueray-Willaume** - Born in 1879 in Kensington, with 3 subsequently born sisters born in India as his father was a Bombay Revenue Surveyor. Frederick married Violet Holford in 1905, divorcing her on grounds of adultery in 1908, when he served on HMS Britannia whilst serving in the Royal Military Artillery. In 1911 he lived with his parents in Bedford, his occupation is given as a Captain in the Marine Artillery- a division of the Royal Marines, to man the artillery in bomb vessels. The family of 5 had 3 servants.

Frederick married Margaret Cory Tanqueray in 1913. They were second cousins. She was sister of David Yeo Tanqueray who was also a survivor living in Ivy House, High Street. They shared a great-great grandfather whose brother created the worldwide gin empire which originated in Bedfordshire in the 1830's. The Tanqueray family were originally silversmiths in France but left for England in the 18th century and built a life in Tingrith, Bedfordshire. Three generations of the family became rectors and built Tanqueray House as their family home, a Grade II listed house that still stands in the village today. However, in 1830 their great uncle Charles Tanqueray defied family tradition when aged 20 and decided to leave Tingrith for London to establish a distillery, instead of becoming a clergyman. Frederick died in 1919 in Gosport of pneumonia.

#### **Clophill and District Flower Club**

We were delighted to welcome back Theresa Rodrigues to our November meeting with her intriguing title 'Gardens by the Bay'. We were to imagine a 12 hour flight to a tropical island, hot temperatures and driving to an iconic hotel that featured in the BBC Two programme 'Amazing Hotels'.

Singapore was our destination which brought back very fond memories for me as I had stayed at the hotel in 2014.

Theresa's first arrangement was inspired by the hotel which is located along the Marina Bay waterfront and features three cascading towers topped by an extraordinary Sky Park, resembling a surf board, complete with infinity pool! To depict this Theresa chose a horizontal design which was raised on top of a tall stand and into prearranged foliage she placed Irises, white Avalanche Roses and Coral sprayed silver to resemble the sky and water.

From the Sky Park you can get an excellent view of the 'Gardens by the Bay' which brings to life Singapore's vision of creating a city in a garden. Theresa's four arrangements each focused on a particular garden. Inspired by the architecture of the Esplanade Theatres in the East Garden and a conscious effort to reduce the use of floral foam, Theresa had produced a 3D structure using bamboo and sticks. Into this she interwove flowers as if she were producing a hand tied bunch.

One of the key highlights of the 'Gardens by the Bay' is the grove of soaring, surreal structures known as Supertrees. These sustainable vertical gardens span 25 to 50 metres in height and house over 162,900 plants of over 200 species. This was to be the inspiration for Theresa's final design. Known for her creativity she produced her own version of a supertree, a tree trunk covered with moss into which she had incorporated succulent plants. She then produced an all-round arrangement on the top followed by lights twisted around the trunk. The six arrangements were very individual with excellent & varied choice of flowers and foliage, including Calla



Lilies, Cymbidium Orchids, Strelitzia's, Protea Pincushion, Cock's Comb, Ginger, Gerbera & Roses. A very interesting demonstration ending with a beautiful display of arrangements.
