Come into the Garden

With the changes in weather, I thought it could be good to have a quick look at those pests and diseases that are causing concern and which the RHS are actively monitoring.

Chestnut blight (Cryphonectria parasitica) is a fungal disease that poses a significant threat to sweet chestnut



in the UK. It has devastated American chestnut in Northern America and sweet chestnut in Europe. Look out for cankers (swollen or sunken) on the trunk, on which masses of yellow orange to red-brown pustules (fruiting bodies) form. Branches die back and eventually the tree may be killed.

Oriental chestnut gall wasp (Dryocosmus kuriphilus) is a small insect (2.5-3mm) with a black body and orange-brown legs whose larvae feed within the buds of trees. Look out for green, rose-coloured or red galls up to 4cm in diameter on the buds, leaves, and leaf stalks which causes leaf distortion as a result of the growth of the galls. Leaves affected by the gall wasp can drop early or remain on the tree throughout the winter.

Oak processionary moth (OPM) (Thaumetopoea processionea] are defoliating pests of oak. The caterpillars have allergy-inducing hairs that can cause breathing problems and rashes. The caterpillars are covered in long white hairs and move in distinctive nose to tail processions and produce white webbing nests in oak trees in early summer.

#NoMowMay is a national campaign run by Plantlife, the British conservation charity that is working nationally and internationally to save threatened wildflowers, plants and fungi. Once again, they are encouraging us to resist mowing our lawns until the end of May in order to boost the flowers and nectar available to pollinating insects, such as bees, butterflies and moths.

Campaign research has revealed that mowing your lawn less frequently can provide enough food for ten times the number of bees, butterflies, moths, beetles and other pollinators. A recent study found that rural honeybees have to fly further to find food than their urban counterparts, which suggests that wild flowers are much less abundant than those grown in the gardens of more builtup areas.

This time of year, is nesting season so always check for signs of activity before getting out the pruners. The Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 protects bird nests, so it is an offence to damage or destroy them. Smaller shrubs are less likely to hide a nest but be especially cautious if tackling dense or mature shrubs and trees. Only start work once you are happy you will not be disturbing wildlife and stop immediately if you have any suspicion birds may be nesting. If need be, you can complete the work after August when nesting season should be over.

Cut back tender shrubs such as Penstemon, Caryopteris and Fuchsia after the danger of frost has passed. Prune spring-flowering shrubs such as japonica or Japanese quince (Chaenomeles), Choisya and Ribes after flowering. Remove one stem in three from Kerria and Spiraea and shorten the other flowered stems to a suitable sideshoot. Evergreens such as Viburnum tinus can also still be trimmed this month. These all flower on the wood that grows over the summer so don't be tempted to leave this to the autumn as you will be cutting off all of next Springs flowers.

Prune overcrowded, dead or diseased stems of Clematis montana once it has finished flowering. Untangling the stems can be fiddly, but once you can see where you are cutting, you need not worry about pruning this plant as it will take being cut down to about 30 cms very well.

Reflections – Clophill in May 1980 - Voices from the past.

Continuing our series looking back at previous issues of Spotlight and Clophill Village life... By Julie Benson."

Well, the front cover shows something which you will now see no longer looking like this – the frontage to the Green Man public house!

Looking inside the cover, there's an advertisement for something else that you won't see any more, but still so relevant. It has the title of COLLECT WASTE- COLLECT MONEY! It goes on to say "So



you despair of the things that you have to put in your dustbin and plastic objects we throw away? Well, some of these things can be **collected and sold for charity** or club funds." The guides collected newspaper; Robert Bloomfield School collected silver paper in aid of Guide Dogs for the Blind and ring pulls from drinks cans by the Cub Scouts in aid of Kidney Machines. (Well done those groups.)

Other topics filling the pages include **Parish Council** activities – and here "The District Council has submitted its proposed alterations to the **Clophill Boundary** – Cainhoe Manor area to Gravenhurst; Land S of Warren Farm to Silsoe and Hall End from Maulden to Clophill." Residents are encouraged to write in support of the latter as Maulden was expected to object. "It is hoped that an arrangement can be made with Silsoe concerning the transfer of the County Garage area (now the Jet) to Clophill".

Reflections – Clophill in April 1980 - continued ...

Under the heading of 'Change of Scenery' "Now that the **River Water Authority** have dredged the River Flitt and have built up the banks in the vicinity of the **Flying Horse** car park, Whitbread, the brewers, plan to landscape the grounds."

The report from the Village Hall mentions its hoped for storage extension; plans for the annual fete and a craft exhibition in September organised by Sylvia Lammas. She was also paid tribute as "the best booking secretary the hall has ever had" at the AGM when a new Committee was elected with Mac Ilett (Chairman), Jeffery Berliner (Secretary), Ian Selth (Treasurer), Sylvia Lammas (Booking Sec), Wendy Berliner, Carol Mew, Frankie Lovatt and Keith Fossey.

The **Kiln Youth Club** was looking for equipment - tennis racquets and balls, cricket bats and balls - or anything! There were some **musically talented** children in the village 40 years ago – and I am sure that there are some today as well. Hazel Brooks- 8yrs (distinction), Jane Turton - 8 yrs (Merit), Jane Miller-8yrs and Zoe Wardely - 11 yrs each gained their Piano grade 1 exams, while William Knowles - 11 yrs gained grade III violin with merit as well as his piano grade V.

This rather caught my eye along with recipes for Chocolate Crunch and Raspberry Mousse and the activities of the five pubs – Tug-o-War and Darts, all five hostelries sporting busy teams - it's 'Local History'. The first of the series has as its title 'Old Clophill Shops - part one'. "Today there are only two surviving general stores in the village from an age when the people of Clophill had to shop locally and could purchase all their clothes, shoes, etc from the village, which they left only on very rare occasions. We don't have to go back so far to find about fifteen shops within the village. We are unable to give accurate dates, but we believe we are correct in saying that these shops were around Clophill during the first 50 years of this century. A general stores once stood on the left hand side at the top of Jacques Lane, owned by the Stimson family. Part of Tony Ashton's property (that is to the right of 80 High Street), used to be a sweet and hardware shop owned by the Parkinson family. A store run by Betsy Maudling at 58 High Street, specialised in sweets and meat. At this shop a pig was cut up and sold about once a week after it had been cared for and fattened up by various people in the village, the food being supplied by the local mill. Wooton House near the Causeway was another very pleasant village shop until very recently. Many people will remember Mrs Wooton bless her. This was Clophill's first Post Office and, as well as the shop, local people went there to be measured for their new suits. A pony and trap was also operated to take patients to the doctor's or to market. A shop was run by Mr J. Smith in a wooden building on the corner of the cross roads opposite 'The Flying Horse'. Mr Smith was a Parish and Church Councillor and was a very well-known and respected parishioner. There were toys, sweets, groceries, 2d (2 pence) draught boards, drapery etc. all sold at 7 High Street in a shop run by Mrs Mead and her sister. Another former owner, a Mr Harris, is said to have drowned himself in a garden water butt!" Well, that's an ending – in more ways than one!

light snacks and barista coffee from local suppliers Wooden Hill. Open 9am – 5pm, 7 days a week the site is cashless and payment for parking by card or contactless is **on exit** (£3.50 for up to 3 hours or £5.50 for over 3 hours).

All funds raised contribute towards the day-to-day running of the Nature Reserve which is run on a not-for-profit basis for the benefit of both visitors and wildlife.

<u>Clophill Village Hall – Annual Report 2025</u>

The financial year 2024-2025 has seen the Village Hall reporting a deficit of £1,554 which is almost entirely driven by repairs to the fire alarm system and emergency lighting which are clearly non negotiables when running our type of operation, otherwise our other performance metrics remain very satisfactory.

Over and above the costs of maintenance we have invested in a new online booking system which should make the customer interaction with us a lot slicker. This is supported by a fully upgraded website, again which should help prospective customers see what we have to offer and ensure the interface between the website and the booking system is seamless, but as always, we will always offer prospective customers the opportunity to talk to a human being to ensure their needs are fully met!

This year represents something of a change in the makeup of the Village Hall Management Committee. Significantly the core of the Committee that came together some 22 years ago have decided to 'call it a day' and step down from the Committee, me included, and pass on our legacy on to a new team.

The core of the Committee came together in 2003 when we were operating in a rather old and decrepit hall that had long since passed its 'sell-by' date and despite the valiant efforts of Tina Goddard-Mason the outgoing chair, the Committee had been frustrated in raising the necessary funds to replace the hall.

I took up the role of Chair at that time and was joined by a number of my ex St Mary's PTA Committee members in building a new Committee to try and raise the funds to build the new hall. To cut a long story short we managed to raise over £400,000 much of which came from the National Lottery (about £700,000 in todays money) and in 2004 Roger Catton and the late great Keith Fossey ceremonially dug the first sods of earth to kick off the project (the picture still hangs in the Committee Room at the hall).

The inevitable consequence of this group staying together for around 22 years is that as they came together, they would most likely step down together which has been the case this year, but hopefully this raises the opportunity for some new blood to join the Committee and take the Village Hall to its next stage.

I would like to thank all those individuals who have served on the Committee (too many to mention here) and unselfishly offered their own time to maintain and develop what I still believe is one if the finest village Halls in Bedfordshire.

Special thanks also go to the Clophill Parish Council who in its various forms has always supported us in providing a vital service to residents of Clophill and beyond.

I wish the new Committee all the very best for the future.

In school, children will continue to be encouraged to ask questions when they do not understand, especially in their lessons. The importance of speaking and listening will be emphasised as a crucial part of the learning process. We will promote the understanding that we should all be working towards peace in our world starting with ourselves as individuals. We will use stories and examples of occasions when people have not listened to instructions carefully, have therefore misunderstood and the resulting unfortunate consequences.

At home, you should encourage your children to ask questions if they do not understand and make sure that they listen to your explanations. Try to back up requests with reasons so as to promote understanding. You could also share the story 'Lost and Found' by Oliver Jeffers. It demonstrates how long it takes for the boy to understand his friend the penguin and how important this understanding was in the end. You could also watch 'Giraffes Can't Dance' by Giles Andreae on You Tube and see how Gerald the Giraffe eventually learns to dance by listening to and understanding instructions.

It's been a fascinating month of discovery and creativity at school as we've been learning all about the human body, guided by the children's interests and endless curiosity. Our journey began with the digestive system, where the children created clever moving models to show how our bodies process food — from the moment we take a bite to the fi-



nal stages. It was a brilliant hands-on way to understand how the body works.



To truly "get under the skin," each child wore a white Tshirt and, working in pairs, used fabric paint to map out the organs on their bodies. With teamwork and plenty of giggles, they helped each other carefully place and paint each organ in the correct location — a fantastic mix of science, art, and collaboration.

We've also been exploring the respiratory system in a very active way. Every day this month, the children have been training their lungs using a peak flow machine, aiming to improve their readings day by day. They've been recording their results and are thoroughly enjoying the challenge of seeing their lung capacity grow week by week. It's been a great way to combine health, self-awareness, and a little

friendly competition!

The children also had the exciting opportunity to take part in real-life scientific exploration through dissection. We visited the local butcher and bought offal, which gave each child the chance to dissect a heart, lungs, and a kidney. This was done in a safe, respectful, and supervised environment, and the children were full of awe and wonder at seeing the structures they had been learning about up close. As a group, we also carried out an adult-led dissection of a cockerel, allowing the children to observe how all the organs are positioned and connected inside a living system.



Inspired by Leonardo da Vinci's fascination with anatomy, we then ventured into the world of artistic expression. The children created detailed still-life skull drawings, sketched each other in dynamic poses, and even used roller ink to produce vibrant pop-art style prints of their lungs. The results were truly stunning, showcasing their creativity while deepening their scientific understanding.

It's been a wonderful month filled with questions, discoveries, creativity, and collaboration. The children have shown incredible enthusiasm and maturity throughout, and we are so proud of everything they've achieved. We look forward to seeing everyone at the village fete, where the children will be running their own stall, all orchestrated by their own ideas.

Clophill's Servicemen of World War 2

Remembering the lives of the 6 WW2 men listed on our Village

Memorial. By Sue Pearson

VE Day was commemorated across our country on 8th May 2025. This is the first of 6 articles about those men listed on our village memorial that lost their lives in WW2. The average age of the Clophill men who died was 23.6 years.

War had begun 273 days before the village heard of the loss of our first man - **Ernest Arthur Webb.**

Ernest was listed as Private 5825717 of the 1st Battalion Suffolk Regiment. He died on Friday 31 May 1940, aged 26. He was one of the village's oldest men to die.

He was born August 1913 in Haynes- Son of Levi Walter Webb (born in Clophill) and Violet Annie (née Sutton) of 1 Clayhill Cottages, Maulden. In 1911 Levi's family lived on the High Street, Clophill.

Ernest is commemorated in Wulpen Churchyard, Jabbeke, Belgium - inscription "SLEEP ON, DEAR SON; TAKE THY REST FOR THE LORD KNOWS BEST. ALL HIS FAMILY."

September 1939: On the outbreak of war, the Battalion was based in Devonport. His Battalion was part of 8th Infantry Brigade, 3rd Division; in October 1939 they went to France. At the time of Ernest's death, the Battalion was thought to be holding the German troops back in preparation for the evacuation at Dunkirk. He was initially reported as missing but was later presumed to have died.
